A Message from the Board of Trustees: We are pleased to present the proposed 2024-25 budget to the community, which continues the Library's commitment to excellence while staying within the New York State tax cap. The budget was developed with an awareness of the present fiscal climate and accounts for inflation costs and increased mandated expenses while maintaining all services.

The proposed budget carries a 1.5% spending increase and a 2.7% tax levy increase. The total tax levy is \$60,000 below the tax cap limit and our ONLY tax increase in the past four years.

Last year, our diverse programs and community events drew an impressive attendance of over twenty-three thousand. Furthermore, our community members checked out over one hundred and fifty thousand items and took advantage of over fifteen hundred free museum passes and discounted tickets. Your participation and support make all this possible; please vote on April 4 and help us continue our long-standing tradition of excellence in library services.

The community will also elect a trustee to the library board on April 4. The trustee's five-year term will run from July 1, 2024, to June 30, 2029. The incumbent trustee is Joseph Gabriel. If you are interested in running for this seat, petitions are due at the Library or the District Clerk's office on or before Wednesday, March 6 at 5 p.m.




